## 9<sup>th</sup> Grade

### **Black Mirror by Nancy Werlin**

Convinced her brother's death was murder rather than suicide, sixteen-year-old Frances begins her own investigation into suspicious student activities at her boarding school.

### **Driver's Ed by Caroline B. Cooney**

Three teenagers' lives are changed forever when they take part in a prank that turns deadly and they have to face up to their part in the tragedy.

### **Rumble Fish by S.E. Hinton**

A junior high school boy idolizes his older brother, the coolest, toughest guy in the neighborhood, and wants to be just like him.

### **Murder on the Orient Express by Agatha Christie**

A remarkable set of characters, each a secretive soul, assemble for a journey on the Orient Express train as it travels from Istanbul to Paris. On hand to resolve the murder of an American passenger is Hercule Poirot, the dapper Belgian detective.

### **Fever, 1793 by Laurie Halse Anderson**

Sixteen-year-old Matilda Cook, separated from her sick mother, learns about perseverance and self-reliance when she is forced to cope with the horrors of the yellow fever epidemic in Philadelphia in 1793.

### **Persepolis by Marjane Satrapi**

Contains black-and-white comic strip images in which the author shares the story of her life in Tehran, Iran, where she lived from ages six to fourteen while the country came under control of the Islamic regime.

### **Soldier Boys by Dean Hughes**

Two boys, one German and one American, are eager to join their respective armies during World War II, and their paths cross at the Battle of the Bulge.

### **Surviving Hitler by Andrea Warren**

Jack Mandelbaum was 12 when the Nazis came to Poland in 1939. At first the thought of war was "thrilling." Then he saw his prosperous, happy home torn apart, and he spent three years as a teenager in the death camps in Germany, where he survived by a combination of courage, friendship, and luck.

## 10<sup>th</sup> Grade

### **Son of the Mob by Gordon Korman**

Seventeen-year-old Vince's life is constantly complicated by the fact that he is the son of a powerful Mafia boss, a relationship that threatens to destroy his romance with the daughter of an FBI agent.

### **Monster by Walter Dean Myers**

While on trial as an accomplice to a murder, sixteen-year-old Steve Harmon records his experiences in prison and in the courtroom in the form of a film script as he tries to come to terms with the course his life has taken.

### **Left for Dead: A Young Man's Search for Justice for the USS Indianapolis by Pete Nelson and Hunter Scott**

Torpedoed by a Japanese submarine, the Indianapolis went down in minutes, taking more than 800 sailors with it. Several hundred survived, but only after spending days in the open sea with sharks diminishing their numbers hourly.

### **The Curious Incident of the Dog in the Nighttime by Mark Haddon**

When his neighbor's poodle is killed and the 15-year old autistic narrator, Christopher, is falsely accused of the crime, he decides that he will take a page from Sherlock Holmes (one of his favorite characters) and track down the killer.

### **Ties that Bind by Lensey Namioka**

Ailin's life takes a different turn when she defies the traditions of upper class Chinese society by refusing to have her feet bound.

### **All Quiet on the Western Front by Erich Maria Remarque**

Depicts the experiences of a group of young German soldiers fighting and suffering during the last days of World War I.

### **Under the Persimmon Tree by Suzanne Fisher Staples**

A young Afghan girl, Najmah, befriends an American woman, Nusrat in Peshawar, Pakistan, after Najmah flees her native Afghanistan during the 2001 war; and together they begin a long journey to locate their missing loved ones.

### **Gandhi: His Life and Message for the World by Louis Fischer**

Gandhi's life and message can be a life-changing experience for one willing to think about his search for Truth, and his unwillingness to compromise even in the face of seemingly insurmountable opposition.

## 11<sup>th</sup> Grade

### **Bleachers by John Grisham**

When his old coach dies, high school football star Neely Crenshaw returns to his hometown after fifteen years, reunites with his former teammates, and struggles to resolve his mixed feelings about the man.

### **Before We Were Free by Julia Alvarez**

In the early 1960s in the Dominican Republic, twelve-year-old Anita learns that her family is involved in the underground movement to end the bloody rule of the dictator, General Trujillo.

### **The Pact: Three Young Men Make a Promise and Fulfill a Dream by Drs. Sampson Davis, George Jenkins and Rameck Hunt**

Filled with drama, courage, temptation, and ultimately, triumph, this is the uplifting story of three teenaged boys from broken homes in Newark, NJ who pledged to support one another in realizing their dreams.

### **The Color of Water: A Black Man's Tribute to His White Mother by James McBride**

An African-American male tells of his mother, a white woman, who refused to admit her true identity.

### **Swallowing Stones by Joyce McDonald**

When 17-year-old Michael discovers that he has accidentally killed the father of a schoolmate, he wrestles with his own guilt until he can no longer keep his terrible secret.

### **Fallen Angels by Walter Dean Myers**

Seventeen-year-old Richie Perry, just out of his Harlem high school, enlists in the Army in the summer of 1967 and spends a devastating year on active duty in Vietnam.

### **Hiroshima by John Hersey**

The story of six people who lived through the explosion of the atomic bomb in 1945 in Hiroshima.

### **Nickel and Dimed: On (not) getting by in America by Barbara Ehrenreich**

The author relates her experiences from 1998 to 2000, during which time she joined the ranks of the working poor as a waitress, cleaning woman, and Wal-Mart clerk to see for herself how America's "unskilled" workers are able to survive on only \$6 or \$7 an hour.

## 11<sup>th</sup> Grade Continued

### **The Day the World Came to Town: 9-11 in Gander, Newfoundland - Jim DeFede**

In the immediate aftermath of the attacks on the World Trade Center and the Pentagon, 38 commercial airliners carrying over 6,000 passengers were forced, as a precautionary measure, to land in Gander, Newfoundland, Canada. The message of the book is how, even in times of great turmoil and conflict, people can and must look to one another for comfort, help, and hope.

## Wildcard Choices

### **Manhunt: The 12-Day Chase for Lincoln's Killer by James L. Swanson**

For 12 days after his brazen assassination of Abraham Lincoln, John Wilkes Booth was at large, and in *Manhunt*, historian James L. Swanson tells the vivid, fully documented tale of his escape and the wild, massive pursuit.

### **The Secret Life of Bees by Sue Monk Kidd**

When Lily's beloved nanny, Rosaleen, manages to insult a group of angry white men on her way to register to vote and has to skip town, Lily takes the opportunity to go with her, fleeing to the only place she can think of--Tiburon, South Carolina--determined to find out more about her dead mother.
